Lyon-Coffey's Ray Hutson to be inducted

Ray Hutson, assistant manager of Lyon-Coffey, has been selected for the 2011 Kansas Cooperative Council Hall of Fame.

Hutson had been nominated by Bluestem's member services director, Ron Dickey, for this honor.

"Ray exemplifies what the cooperative principals stand for and lives by them every day he is at work," Dickey said. "He started with Coffey County Electric Cooperative as an apprentice lineman 40 years ago and has always kept up on the changes within their electric system and therefore understands the entire system."

The KCC Hall of Fame committee elected to induct Hutson, as well as Norbert Gerstenkorn, the former general manager of Farmers Cooperative Grain in Conway Springs, and Dale Bruce (posthumously), an attorney for many credit unions and their organizations.

All three deserving inductees will be honored at a reception the evening before the joint KFSA/KCC annual meeting on March 21 in Wichita.

"The Hall of Fame is important for recognizing those who have gone above and beyond the call in advancing the cooperative philosophy,"

More than 210 electric cooperative trustees, managers and key staff attended the Kansas Electric Cooperatives, Inc., 69th Annual Meeting on January 24-25, 2011, at the Maner Conference Centre in Topeka.

Two board leadership courses were offered to the Trustees prior to convening the annual meeting. Scott Luecal facilitated 974.1 Rate Strategies for 21st Century Challenges, and Colette Trohan facilitated 903.1 The Role of the Board Chair in Conducting Effective Meetings.

meeting included Senator Jerry Moran who talked about the nation's economy, policies to create job, the health care reform bill, and EPA's efforts to regulate greenhouse gasses.

"I am ready to go to work. I think there was a strong message (in the last election), and one that almost all Kansans share, that Federal government needs to get its financial house in shape," Moran said.

He stated that this is an important time in our economy.

IBM study: electric cars stir interest but face obstacles

Automobile industry executives believe that sales of traditional vehicles will peak before 2020 and are looking to electric-only vehicles (EVs) as the next hot product, but they will first have to address stringent consumer requirements about performance, recharging, and convenience, according to a new IBM survey. Nearly one-fifth of drivers are likely to consider an electric vehicle; but drivers are reluctant to bear the cost of home charging.

MIT program exceeds electricity reduction goal

Through diligence and effective collaboration with NSTAR, MIT has exceeded the first-year energy savings goal of Efficiency Forward by 30 percent. Efficiency Forward is a ground-breaking, multi-million dollar energy conservation and efficiency initiative launched by MIT and NSTAR in 2010 with a first-year goal of achieving campus-wide energy savings of 10 million kilowatt-hours. The actual reduction amount for the first year came in at an impressive 13 million kilowatt-hours.

MIT Efficiency Forward is a first-of-its-kind program with a utility company and is the single largest energy efficiency program NSTAR has developed with a customer.

create our own energy supplies and reduce our dependence on OPEC," he said. "We live our lives in a pretty special way in Kansas. I want to make it so our kids and grandkids can raise their families in the place we call home."

Governor Sam Brownback visited with the cooperative representatives during the luncheon. He spoke about the importance of growth in our state's economy.

"The key is growth," Brownback said. "We need to build the Holcomb Power Plant. We want to see our rural areas grow."

He explained how he would like to designate rural areas showing double-digit population loss and offer incentives to waive income tax for five years as an incentive for people to move into those areas.

"We want to encourage people to move back home."

Other speakers included State Senator Jay Emler, Senate Majority Leader; Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt; Chris Courtwright, Kansas Research Department's principal economist; Ken Keylor, Ohio statewide's vice president of statewide services; Seth Hart, CoBank's vice presi-

dent of electric distribution; Stuart Lowry, KEC; Phil Irwin, Federated Rural Electric Insurance Exchange's President and CEO; and Melinda Becker, the 2010-2011 Kansas' representative to the NRECA Youth Leadership Council.

The KEC Loss Control, Safety and Compliance Department recognized cooperatives that earned No Lost Time Accident Awards and the National Safety Accreditation for 2010.

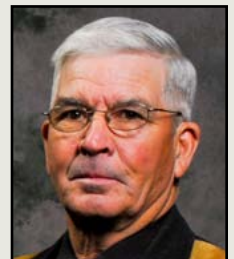
